


The President's Corner by Mickey Breunig, President -LMAC

In Case Of Emergency

This was sent to me by an LMAC club member which he found and thought it was something that all of us should consider doing.

ICE for your Flight Box or Tx Case

Hello all.

This was shared with me and the other Zone Directors recently and thnk this is a tremendous recommendation - and more importantly, might save a life. The email follows from John Fennell, MAAC 84340, Westphal, N.S. Regards

Gentlemen.

My name is John Fennell, MAAC #84340. I am an active member of the two flying clubs in Dartmouth, N.S.

As recently as this past Sunday, we had an indoor flying event at the Shearwater gymnasium. We had an excellent turn out from both flying clubs. However, we also had a medical emergency crop up. One of the members collapsed on the gym floor. A first aid person was immediately summoned along with the paramedics from the air base. They looked after this person before the regular city paramedics came in to take over. The man was taken to the local hospital to be checked out. He was released after several hours after medical tests were done on this man.

This same sort of incident happened at the Shannon Park field in Dartmouth in the Fall. Again the medics were called in and the gentleman was taken to the local hospital and released a day or so later. After this happened, the executive of the Halifax Electric Flyers club, mentioned at the AGM, that we should all put some sort of medical info in our flight kits or transmitter boxes. The info that should be included would be. Next of kin's name and phone number, all medications a person is on to aid the first responders, and doctors name and clinic phone number (optional). I have put my info in my transmitter box and told everybody about it.

I know that some people might find this a little invasion of privacy. I am not asking for everything, just good info for the medical staff to have on hand for the person in distress.

We may know all the people that fly around us but do we really know the persons, in some cases, last name, or the spouses name and phone number. There must be dozens of flying fields around Canada that really don't have a civic address for the medical staff to get to the emergency. The 911 people would have to rely on the GPS signal from the persons cell phone. The incident at Shannon Park was a prime example about an unknown address. The 911 people were the ones that gave us the right address.

I am sure there are a lot of members spouses or extended family that would like to be notified about their loved one and the medical problems he or she may have.

I feel very strong about this idea. Like I said before, I am not looking for personal info, but this beats looking through somebodies wallet for info on them. The medical info on any prescription drugs a person is on would be a huge benefit to the first responders. This info could save a life.

Murphy's War

Murphy's War is set in South America, in the backwaters of the global conflict (World War 2). It focuses on a stubborn survivor of a sunken merchant ship who is consumed in his quest for revenge and retribution against the German submarine which sunk his ship. When he discovers the U-boat is hiding farther up river, under the cover of the jungle, he sets about obsessively plotting to sink it by any means, including using a surviving <u>Grumman J2F Duck floatplane</u> from the merchant ship sunk by the German sub. 9t's a Mad, Mad, Mad World



It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World is a 1963 American epic comedy film, produced and directed by Stanley Kramer and starring Spencer Tracy with an all-star cast, about the madcap pursuit of \$350,000 in stolen cash by a diverse and colorful group of strangers. The dentist and his beautiful wife (Sid Caesar and Edie Adams) are trying to beat all the other's to the "Big W" so they can dig up the cash. So they hire a pilot to fly them. Turns out the pilot's plane is an old dilapidated Jenny that can't keep up with cars.







Trying to get to the "Big W" before all the others, Buddy Hacket and Mickey Rooney are trying to fly a twin-engine plane because the pilot they hired has become incapacitated (unconscious). They have no clue at all how to fly the plane and at one point end up flying through a billboard. They also fly through a hangar at the Charles M. Schulz Sonoma County airport. And after landing they taxi into a restaurant at the airport.





The airport terminal scenes were filmed at the now-defunct Rancho Conejo Airport in Newbury Park, California, though the control tower shown was constructed only for filming. Other airplane sequences were filmed at the Sonoma County Airport north of Santa Rosa, California; at the Palm Springs International Airport; and in the skies above Thousand Oaks, Camarillo, and Orange County. In the Orange County scene, stuntman Frank Tallman flew a Beech model C-18S through a highway billboard advertising Coca-Cola. A communications mix-up resulted in the use of linen graphic sheets on the sign rather than paper, as planned. Linen, much tougher than paper, damaged the plane on impact. Tallman managed to fly it back to the airstrip, discovering that the leading edges of the wings had been smashed all the way back to the wing spars. Tallman considered that incident the closest he ever came to dying on film. (Both Tallman and his business partner and fellow flier on Mad World, Paul Mantz, would eventually die in separate air crashes over a decade apart.)

In another scene, Tallman flew the plane through an airplane hangar at about 150 knots, with only 23 feet of clearance from wingtips to walls and only 15 feet from the top of the tail to the hangar ceiling.
