

2018 Swap Meet Results by Joe Woods



First, I want to thank everyone who helped with this year's Swap Meet. I was not able to attend this year; but I was told that we again had a good turnout of members to do the setup of the tables at the Jack Pot Bingo Hall. The Club gives a special thanks to Martin Weinstock, Carroll Ware, Lester Ware and Ralph and Tom Herms for running the Swap Meet. There were a few less tables available this year; but the number of tables was just enough to match the number sold. Again, the core group of members who reset the tables had their hands full.

We were significantly down in tables rented from last year's record. We rented 76 versus 90; but still up from 2016's 56. We were down \$169 for table rental. Buyer's fees were down \$26 from last year; but donations were up \$276. Expenses were about the same and finally the raffle profit was up \$43 resulting in an overall profit of \$1555; which was up \$111 from last year. The \$1555 profit is a record. The donation activity was the major category that drove our financial success. Thanks to Steve Belt for donating his dad's stuff and to Mike Higgins for the building supplies. There were numerous items that came from the members that added to the total collection. Thank you to all who donated items. Lester Ware again managed the sales of the donated items – he did a great job!

To try to hold the buyers, we continued the "Door Prize" presentation like last year. Tower Hobbies donated two \$25 gift certificates this year. Winners must be present to win. The Raffle item was a very nice Seaplane (that also has wheels) purchased from Coyote Hobbies at cost. Carroll Ware made sure that the Raffle activity was a financial success by buying a bunch of tickets. He was fortunate to win the plane.

I welcome any suggestions as to how we could have a better Swap Meet. Any ideas of how to get more buyers to attend would be helpful. Hopefully, our members enjoyed the opportunity to interact and possibly pickup some bargains. The Swap Meet continues to generate about \$1500 for the club treasury.

# Airplanes in the Movies: Catch-22(1970) By Paul Bail



Synopsis: B-25 bombardier Captain Yossarian is trying desperately to be certified insane during World War II, so he can stop flying missions.











Joseph Heller's absurdist anti-war novel <u>Catch-22</u> is set on a <u>U.S. Army Air Corps</u> bomber squadron base on the Italian island Pianosa during <u>World War II</u>. Heller notes in the introduction that Pianosa is obviously too small to "accommodate all the actions described." Heller's Pianosa has a small community of Italian villagers, unlike the real island. "From early May 1944 until December 1944 [Heller] was stationed on the island of Corsica where he flew sixty combat missions in B-25 'Mitchell' bombers with the 488th Bombardment Squadron, 340th Bombardment Group, 57th Bombardment Wing, 12th Air Force.

If Catch-22 were remade today, the movie producer/director would use computer-generated special effects to create a squadron of 18 B-25 bombers. But when Catch-22 was originally made back in 1970, computer-generated special effects were not widely used. So what did they do back in 1970 to come up with a squadron of B-25's? They bought them. The opening scene of Catch-22 shows the entire squadron in action, taking off from the location mentioned in the book, Pianosa, Italy ... a small island off the coast of Italy. "Paramount assigned a \$17 million budget to the production and planned to film key flying scenes for six weeks, but the aerial sequences required six months of camera work, resulting in the bombers flying about 1,500 hours. They appear on screen for approximately 10 minutes.

Catch-22 is renowned for its role in saving the <u>B-25 Mitchell</u> aircraft from possible extinction. The film's budget accommodated 17 flyable <u>B-25 Mitchells</u>, and one hulk was acquired in Mexico, and flown with landing gear down to the <u>Guaymas</u>, <u>Sonora</u>, <u>Mexico</u> filming location. The aircraft was burned and destroyed in the crash landing scene. The wreck was then buried in the ground by the runway, where it remains.

For the film, prop upper turrets were installed, and to represent different models, several aircraft had turrets installed behind the wings representing early (B-25C/D type) aircraft. Initially, the camera ships also had mock turrets installed, but problems with buffeting necessitated their removal. Many of the B-25's went on to careers in films and television, before being sold as surplus. Fifteen of the 18 bombers remain intact, including one displayed at the Smithsonian Institution's National Air and Space Museum. "

There's one scene showing an L-19 buzzing the beach. I wish I could find the film clip in it's entirety because it displays some really interesting flying. However, the prop of the L-19 strikes a guy and his upper torso is totally destroyed.



All that's left is the lower half of a human being that falls into the ocean. There's another scene where a B-25 gunner is hit in the stomach/abdomen by flak. It's too gory to describe. Young children and other folks that find such images disturbing should not view that scene.

There's one scene that should be of particular interest to us as aeromodeler's: General Dreedle's luxurious, pristine B-25. It's cleaner than a hound's tooth and has white wall tires.



Towards the end of the movie, Yossarian realizes that Capt. Orr, who crashes in the Mediterranean a lot, has been crashing into the ocean on purpose so he can practice rowing (thus his last name ... "Orr"). Capt Orr rows all the way to neutral Sweden where he sits out the war. So Yossarian grabs a dingy out of a crashed B-25 and starts rowing – towards Sweden!
