

LMAC Camera System By Dan Thompson

Why are cameras at the LMAC flying field?

The cameras at the field are there for one purpose and that is safety.

One is that several pilots, me included, don't like to be at the field flying if no one else is there. The reason is in case one should have a problem such as a prop strike. It is difficult to load your planes while holding back a bleeding hand.

Also, if a member should be there by their self and a problem occurs, they may be seen by someone using the cameras and can render assistance either via phone or physically driving to the field.

What was the criteria for the cameras that were chosen?

Multiple viewers can watch simultaneously. Must be able to support more than 100 club members. Cameras can be viewed on smart phones and PC's or Mac's. Minimum effort to add a new member.

Low cost...

The cameras I chose are Wansview. Their initial types were a couple of indoor types and a couple of outdoor types. The two cameras inside the shelter are indoor ones and of course the parking lot cameras are outdoor types. The initial cost was about \$30 each for the indoor ones and \$60 each for the outdoor ones. A used hot spot was purchased on eBay for about \$40.

How does the system work?

Each camera talks to a hot spot which is a WiFi router and a cellular telephone device. This is how the connection to the internet is made.

Each camera has an unique ID and a password. Upon installation of the camera, the parameters are established. The viewer installs the Wansview APP on their phone or PC/MAC and inserts the camera data.

Is there any downside to this system?

The hot spot we use has 15 GB of data at what they call high speed. After the 15 GB is used it reverts to a slow speed for the remainder of the month. Depending on the time of day the high speed runs around 13 Mb and the low speed is a max of 600 Kb. You would think that the speed differential would affect the camera response. Surprising it matters very little. Traffic on the cell phone tower, traffic on the internet and server response will affect the speed more.

Each camera can have four simultaneous viewers. The fifth viewer of a specific camera will get a message of "Max Users Exceeded". If the viewer gets a spinning indicator or a blank screen, it is probably a traffic problem.

As a viewer, is there anything I can do to help?

Yes, view the cameras and kill the APP when you are finished. As long as the camera shot is on your screen, one fourth of that camera is dedicated to you. That is why it is important to kill your APP when finished.
