
BRING YOUR TRAINER (READY TO FLY OR NOT)

Model of the Month



Wingspan 70 inches

Congrats to Dan Thompson for winning Model of the Month.

This LT 40 was assembled from three previous LT 40's. The tail feathers were from a previous crash, years ago. The fuselage was in stock since a local hobby shop closed and the wing was from the current flock of LT 40's.

The purpose for which this plane was assembled is to test various manufacturers' propellers under controlled conditions.

The propulsion is a 60 size brushless electric motor powered by a 6S1P 4500 mah LIPO. It is controlled by a FrSky Taranis radio that has downlink telemetry. On board the plane are sensors for airspeed, motor RPM, motor current draw, ESC and battery temperature, altitude and rate of climb, and a battery reporter that sends down all 6 LIPO cell voltages. These are displayed on the transmitter LCD. I have programmed the transmitter to record these values to the onboard micro SD card when I operate a designated switch. Back at the ranch, the PC downloads these records to a spread sheet so the data can be analyzed.

Airplanes in the Movies by Paul Bail

1. Flight of the Phoenix original version (1965)

A cargo plane (C119?) goes down in a sandstorm in the Sahara with less than a dozen men on board. One of the passengers is an airplane designer who comes up with the idea of ripping off the undamaged wing and using it as the basis for an airplane they will build to escape before their food and water run out. Turns out the airplane designer (Hardy Kruger) designs *model* aircraft – not full scale airplanes – but he doesn't feel the need to tell anybody he's a *model* airplane designer. So, low on food and water, toiling in extreme heat, they take the wrecked pieces of the aircraft and come up with a single engine aircraft. Towards the end of the movie, they're weak, sunburned, exhausted, and after they've already built the plane, Jimmy Stewart and Richard Attenborough are shocked and dismayed to find out that the airplane designer has never ever designed a full-scale airplane … *only MODEL AIRPLANES!!!*

Richard Attenborough:"How much design have you done on the real thing?"Hardy Kruger:"Oh no, no, no. You misunderstand – mycompany makes nothing but model airplanes"."You mean you've never designed a full-sized airplane?"Richard Attenborough:"You mean you've never designed a full-sized airplane?"Hardy Kruger:"Full size, no. But of course the principlesare all the same"."Of course they would be"Hardy Kruger:"One encounters different problems butbasically the principles are the same".

Later, when Hardy Kruger can't hear them: Jimmy Stewart: "He's crazy Lew. He builds toy airplanes". Richard Attenborough: "He never even tried to keep anything from us. He really doesn't think there's any difference".

Later: Richard Attenborough: "It might be better not to mention to the others about being a toy plane designer. Hardy Kruger: "A toy plane designer??" Jimmy Stewart: "Lew and I feel it might upset them".







And so after spending weeks in the desert with little food (pressed dates) and little water, they build the plane. There's a few tense moments when they are using a Coffman starter to start the engine but Jimmy Stewart manages to start the engine. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=IACjOvyx5hs

And of course, they all get on the wing of the plane (including the monkey), the plane takes off, and they manage to fly to an oasis where they survive.

Renowned Hollywood stunt pilot Paul Mantz died during filming of Flight of the Phoenix.





As he was flying the <u>Tallmantz Phoenix P-1</u> over the Arizona desert, the plane struck a small hillock. 2. Flight of the Phoenix remake (2004)

When an Amacore <u>oil rig</u> in the <u>Gobi Desert</u> of <u>Mongolia</u> proves unproductive, Captain Frank Towns (<u>Dennis Quaid</u>) and co-pilot A.J. (<u>Tyrese Gibson</u>) are sent to shut down the operation and transport the crew out of the desert. However, en route to <u>Beijing</u>, a major <u>dust storm</u> disables one engine, forcing them to crash land their <u>C-119 Flying</u> <u>Boxcar</u> in an uncharted area of the <u>Gobi Desert</u>. Their cargo consists of used parts and tools from the rig, the rig's crew, and Elliot (<u>Giovanni Ribisi</u>), a hitchhiker. When the dust storm ends, it becomes apparent that they are 200 miles off course with only a month's supply of water. So they do the only reasonable thing they can do – they make a flyable airplane out of the crashed aircraft.



This movie is so much like the original there's not much to say – same plot, same problems, same plane, same, same, same. John Anderson from <u>Newsday</u> said, "if you've seen the original, there's absolutely no difference in what happens. And very little reason to check it out." Aerofiles, a non-commercial website focusing on North American <u>aviation history</u>, called the film "perhaps the worst remake ever of a classic film." Director John Moore scouted locations in Morocco and Australia before looking at, and quickly choosing, <u>Namibia</u> as the crash site. "Where most of the film takes place, was only a 20 minute-drive from the coastal town of <u>Swakopmund</u>." The <u>Namib Desert</u> location caused problems: cameras and other equipment had to be constantly cleaned of sand, and a "couple of hundred people were employed as 'dune groomers'" so that visual <u>continuity</u> could be maintained.



Four aircraft were used during the film:

- Fairchild C-119G, N15501 flying shots. (still flying as of 2007, now part of the Lauridsen Collection at the Buckeye Municipal Airport, February 2010)
- Fairchild C-119F, BuNo.131700 / N3267U desert wreck.
- Fairchild C-119F, BuNo.131691 Phoenix film prop.
- Fairchild C-119F, BuNo.131706 Phoenix film prop.
- A *Phoenix* that could be taxied but not flown was built for closeups.

The *Phoenix* in flying scenes were done using a <u>radio-controlled model</u> and computer graphics.
